Confirming NHS ongoing commitment

The NHS is committed to supporting the survivors, bereaved and the wider Grenfell impacted community now and into the future.

NHS England identified additional funding for a five-year period starting in 2019. The local NHS has provided health services since the disaster on 14th June 2017. It will continue to provide the range of services needed to meet the health needs of survivors, bereaved and the wider Grenfell impacted community for the long-term.

Future health service provision will be informed by engaging with and listening to survivors, bereaved and the wider community as well as using information from the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment. It will take into consideration:

- 1. the wider issues that impact on residents' health within North Kensington for example housing and economic factors
- 2. seeking independent external advice on what best practice looks like
- 3. critique and challenge to existing provision and guidance on future services.

The NHS has asked for further expert advice from the Scientific Advisory Group (with community representation and participation) to identify what may be required in the future to continue to support the community from 2024 and beyond.

NHS North West London is committed to making sure that the right services are in place to meet the health needs of communities within North Kensington.
